FROM THE EDITOR

This month's Bobbin features an article by Stevie Brooks. The good doctor does not write for us often but when he does write, it is always pertinent.

This month he has done it again with a timely and thought provoking article on the effects of pollution. Pollution is becoming a huge problem especially in Mpumalanga whose fisheries are dependent on water that flows through what is a rapidly developing (some might say over developing countryside). The concern Steve expresses in his article is one that is being voiced more



and more frequently by trout fishers. There is an increasingly pressing need for trout fishers and fly fishers in general to take a greater interest in river health.

I wrote about the issue at Alan Jellis' request in the August 2012 Bobbin (Click here for the article). Both fellow member, Karl Schmidt and NNFC's Graham Steart have raised the need for a basic water testing protocol that all owners and managers of trout waters can use to get a better understanding of the state of their waters and what can be done to protect and improve its health. Peter Arderne of FOSAF has been working tirelessly for years to try and protect the old Transvaal waters from the onslaught of pollution. I spoke to Chris Williams who was recently elected as the chairman of the Northvaal chapter of FOSAF, about this very issue. Turns out he has been working on it as well and, joy of all joys, has access to significant funding.

I deal with this in the reports section of this Bobbin. However it bears mentioning here that looks like we will succeed in defending trout against the mindless prejudice of some environmental officials. Important lessons have are being learnt in the process. The first is that you will find support from the most unexpected quarters within government if you are prepared to make an effort yourself rather than wait for government to do it for you. The second is that you must be principled prepared and responsible. The third is that one must look for solutions rather than just highlight problems.



On importing natural material

I will do a more comprehensive article on this when I have the time to penetrate the often incomprehensible and murky depths of what are South Africa's laws dealing with such matters but suffice it to say that South Africa is becoming increasingly strict about controlling what you can bring into South Africa. This is necessary in order to try and prevent the inadvertent importation of disease and is not a bad thing. It is in fact something all fly fishers should support given that our trout farming industry is one of the few in the world that is disease free. This means that we should stop sneaking materials in via the internet even though this is often the only way to get quality material. We should rather insist that the top dollar our material importers charge for the stuff they do import is backed by material of appropriate quality. Don't expect this to be easy. I complained of the Facebook page Fly Tying South Africa about the shocking quality of the material we used at last month's tie only to have the post pulled by the administrator of that site. This is despite the fact that was well received by the fly tying community who agreed with my comments. It turns out that Fly Tying South Africa is not an independent resource but is heavily reliant upon the support of said importers. So sadly once again commercial self-interest trumped open debate.

I look into... my fly box, and think about all the elements I should consider in choosing the perfect fly: water temperature, what stage of development the bugs are in, what the fish are eating right now. Then I remember what a guide told me: 'Ninety percent of what a trout eats is brown and fuzzy and about five-eighths of an inch long.

Are the AIS list and Regulations lawful?
