

Fishing rule #3: Fishing will do a lot for a man but it won't make him truthful.






Fly Tying and Other Tips

Tying Dry Fly Wings



One of the coolest things in flyting is tying a decent classic Catskill style dry fly. This is because there is no margin for error. Make one mistake and it will stand out like a sore thumb, destroying the beauty of everything else you have achieved. A lot of this has to do with getting the wing right and that isn't easy. Not only must they be tied in right they also need to be perfectly located in the hackle and of the right height. 

Marryat's CDC Winding Tool



I bought this nifty little device some years ago but the need for a large quantity of F flies once again reminded me just how useful it is. The traditional way of tying an F fly is to take a couple of CDC feathers or more if you are tying a large fly and tie them in so the feather tips form a wing. The trouble with this technique is that most of the feathers get wasted. With this tool you use all of a single feather. Simply trap the quill between the four needles locking it in place using the locking collar. Wrap the feather around the tool. When done pinch the feather on the wraps using thumb and for finger and slid it off the tool. Strock the CDC plumes into a bunch still holding the coiled quill. Cut off the quill and tie in the bunched plumes as desired. The tool is simplicity itself. If you want to see more go to Marc Petijeans demo video on You Tube. This tool is not sold locally. The Regulation of Trout

The future of trout fishing in South Africa is under attack like never before. July 19 last year saw trout being listed as invasive species. This was done without the necessary consultation and is unlawful. The Department of Environmental Affairs, while not admitting that this is so, is nonetheless seeking to rectify the situation by the promulgation of new regulations. These will be made available for comment shortly.

Listing trout as invasive will destroy the viability of South Africa's trout hatcheries. With them gone stocking will cease and most of South Africa's trout waters will disappear destroying thousands of jobs and billions of rands of investments.

It is imperative that as many trout fisherman as possible object to the listing of trout when these regulations are published. The Regulation of Trout gives context to this issue by explaining the new law as they affect trout in the context of the regulation of trout since they were first introduced into South Africa nearly 125 years ago.
