REPORTS

2015 recreational fishing survey

Some of you may remember this. It caused a bit of a furor when the survey was first launched because those responsible for the survey did not consult with the fly fishing community in designing the survey. This failure materially departed from the applicable Southwick Associates protocol that requires surveys of this nature to take place in consultation with a project team made up inter alia of leaders from the various fishing communities.

The exclusion of the fly fishing community form the project team resulted in material flaws in the design of the questionnaire which would have resulted in a serious undervaluation of the value of the fly fishing and in particular trout fishing value chains.

This material defect was pointed out to those carrying out the survey. Expert opinion confirmed that while this defect would make invalidate any attempt to disaggregate data regarding a particular type of recreational fishing, such as for example, trout fishing, the data could still be used in an aggregated way to draw conclusion about the value and socio economic contribution of fishing as a whole.

FOSAF sought and obtained an assurance from the Department of Ichthyology at Rhodes University who carried out the research that:

"the disaggregation that will take place will be by habitat (marine vs freshwater vs estuary) and by province and not by sector."

You may recall that mention was made of this in FOSAF's May 2016 Tippet

Well we have just learned that the final report on this survey has now been completed but has not yet been published. The fly fishing community was not represented on the project team that finalized the report and consequently we have no idea what is in it. FOSAF has consequently written to the South African Fishing Tackle Agents and Distributors (SAFTAD) who commissioned the report as well as the Department of Ichthyology at Rhodes University requesting a copy of the report.

Trout Wars Update Jan 2018

It's been a busy Christmas and for those who want the longer story click <u>here</u>. But the big news is that we now know why DEA have apparently reneged on the trout mapping exercise. They are trying to pass a new Biodiversity Act. This is not a recent thing. It what can only be described as a breathtaking act of bad faith, they have spent 3 years negotiating with the trout value chain ion one basis while knowing full well that they intended to change the law to try and take away everything that the trout value chain has been negotiating for.

The trouble is that while the Biodiversity Bill is well written it is also hopelessly unlawful. It seems that DEA are now in a space so far removed from reality that they have have forgotten that laws must be constitutional and that parliament makes laws rather than DEA. I do not know what is worse about this pitiful attempt at law making, the law itself or the fact that DEA thinks they will get away with it.

Angus' Trout




