



FROM THE EDITOR

This is the 21st edition of the Bobbin. Yup July 1994 saw founding Editor Sudesh Persadh produce what was then a 4 page pamphlet. Produced on an Apple Mac, the bobbin was then printed on A3 paper which was then folded to produce said booklet. E mail was in its infancy. Indeed the desktop publishing software that Sudesh used was still pretty revolutionary back then.





June 2002 and it took another year before the current Pdf format was adopted. One cannot understate the massive saving in time, cost and effort that this change meant. The club was pretty big back in 1994. One edition of the Bobbin back in 1995 complained that only 58 members pitched at a meeting. We do about half that today and all we do to get a Bobbin out is to click a mouse. So hats off to those early editors who had to resort to snail mail.

I would have loved to have provided a full history of the Bobbin but regretfully the record is somewhat patchy. I have been unable to obtain past copies of the Bobbin for the periods October 1997 to May 2002 and for the period June 2005 to December 2006 despite diligent enquiry over many years.

What emerges is a story of highs and lows that reflect fairly accurately the highs and lows of the club. The central truth is that members are guaranteed to get a good dividend on what they put into the Durban Fly Tyers but you have to put something in to get something out. And that means more than paying subs. Please don't get me wrong. This is not a criticism or an exhortation to do more for the club. After all we belong to the Durban Fly Tyers because it is fun. If it stops being fun then membership becomes a chore. I have never seen the success of the club in terms of numbers. Indeed the Bobbin suggests that too big a club becomes a problem as the burden of managing robs the committee of the fun of membership. Too much success thus undermines the leadership that is essential to keep the club afloat.

What is clear from a reading of past editions of the Bobbin is that passion counts a lot.

- The club has thrived under the leadership of chairman such as Kevin Cole and Jay Smit who seems to have been able to inspire passion in others.
- There is also a direct return on effort. So the passion displayed in those early years by Sudesh Persadh
 and his successor as Editor Russel Coote paid dividends in terms of the overall success of the club. It
 also would also be remiss of me not to mention Alan Jellis who took over as editor of the Bobbin in
 June 2007 and built the foundations of what is the publication today.
- It is also abundantly clear that editors cannot make bricks without straw. Thus the support given by regular contributors such as Kevin Cole, Alan O Connor and Jack Blackman also added enormously to the success of the Bobbin and thus the club. Likewise it would be remiss of me not to mention the golden threads that run through the history of the Bobbin that are the contributions by Laurence Davies and Graeme Neary. I don't think anyone else has contributes as consistently overs a sustained period as these two gentleman.

I also think that it is clear that although the club has come a bit off the boil of late, it is still in basically good shape. All that is needed to bring it back up to speed is for members to get a bit more involved. Graeme has brought a lot of energy to the club since he has become chairman. It is time for the rest of us to feed that fire with contributions of our own.

IT'S A GIGGLE

It came as a shock to learn how recent this section of the Bobbin is. Indeed if you had asked me I would have said that it had been around for years and years. The truth is it seems to be the brainchild of our illustrious chairman Graham Neary who in September 2009 submitted the following piece under the title "Just For Laughs". That was of course when the Bobbin was edited by Alan Jelllis.

FLY TYING AND OTHER TIPS

Tying One On!

Put your hook into the vice. If it's smaller than size 12, consult your

ophthalmologist beforehand. Now wind on the incredibly fine thread all up and down the hook. After you've accidently broken the incredibly fine thread, start over.

You are now ready to tie on the tail. Take a hackle feather, tear off about 15 hackle points, and tie them on. Make sure the tail is sticking straight out. Having performed this procedure, get out some dubbing wax and rub a little gob of it between your thumb and forefinger. Warning: It's pretty gross. Now get some rabbit fur or some of that synthetic stuff gleaned from carpet remnants and kind of rap it around the thread that

should be hanging down. It isn't? Hmmm.

Anyway, you are now ready to tie on the wings. This is a real pain, particularly if you're trying to tie on duck feathers. You have to make them stand up just so, and one always seems to wind up on the bottom of the hook. Keep the glue off it. *Oops, nice move.*

Now that you've welded the wings together, it's time to tie on the hackle. Tie the hackle feather just ahead of the welded wings, and then wrap it around the shank of the hook. Take the end of the feather and tie it off. The artistic part comes into play here. Tie off the head. Put a glob of black glue on it. I said, you wanted to avoid breaking the barb off the hook. Gee. You'll have to start over again.

Beginners Corner was a feature of the Bobbin in 1994 and 1995. (One was published in 1996) It seems that it was one of those good and necessary ideas that never really caught on. Because, as was explained in the June

1995 edition, the issues raised in this column were addressed comprehensively in the meeting. These days the need for such a column is even more problematic as the internet provides such a wealth of superbly produced instructional videos on how to do just about anything. Kevin Cole reminded members who attended the 2015 AGM that the DFT started in protest against the Natal Fly Dresser's Guild refusing Jack Blackman Life membership. So he and his mates started the DFT and promptly made Jack Blackman its first life members and honorary vice chairman. Jack of course was one of KZN's fishing legends. Very few fly fishers of my vintage didn't have a Jack Blackman story to tell. He helped me as a teenager and introduced me to the mysteries of tying a Walkers Killer. Flake trout into large pieces. Melt butter in pan and add flour, stirring for a minute. Gradually blend in stock and milk, and season with pepper. Boil for 5 min, stirring to prevent sticking. Blend in cheese and sherry, add fish and warm through.

Serving: Pile hot rice in centre of each plate, make a well in rice and fill with mixture. Surround with asparagus.
