

THE MONTHLY TIE

THE KLINKHAMER VARIATION

by Peter Brigg



Materials

- Hook #14 to #16 Klinkhamer styled hook
- Tag red tying thread
- **Abdomen** moose mane (2 hairs, one white and one brown) or stripped peacock herl **Legs** natural squirrel hair
- Post white Antron or similar
- Thorax peacock herl
- Para Hackle hackle feather, preferably grizzly.

Tying Steps

- 1. Add the red tag roughly 3/4 the way around the bend and tie off thread.
- 2. Dress the hook in tying thread leaving about 1.5/2mm behind the hook eye free.
- 3. Add the moose mane or peacock herl on the top of the shank tying in loose turns to a point touching the top of the tag, secure at this point before winding forward.
- 4. Wind the abdomen material forward in touching turns making sure not to twist the two moose mane hairs in each turn. They must be laid side by side to give the barred effect.
- 5. Secure at a point about 1/3 of shank length back from the eye and trim excess.
- 6. If you are going to add UV resin to strengthen the abdomen, now is the time to do it, but just a very thin layer
- 7. Add a small bunch of squirrel tail hairs behind the hook eye tips facing forward still leaving the small gap behind the eye clear. The length of the squirrel over the eye is arbitrary, but must balance with the overall fly. I prefer to keep it to no more than 10mm for a #14.
- 8. Secure the squirrel and trim excess butt ends
- 9. Add the parachute post followed by the hackle feather and secure.
- 10. Optional, but if a thorax is wanted tie in a single peacock herl and wrap around the shank behind and in front of the post, secure and trim excess
- 11. Wind the hackle feather around the post in 3 or 4 turns, secure and trim excess
- 12. Take the tying thread underneath the squirrel and make a few turns to form a small head in the space you left behind the eye. Make a couple of these warps up against the base of the squirrel so that they spread into a fan shape and slightly upwards.
- 13. Whip finish and varnish the head.


